# THE DILWYN CHARITY 2017

Every year, during the Christmas season, a number of events, sponsored jointly by the Choir of St. Mary's Church and Dilwyn Parish Council, take place in support of a selected charity. This year's chosen charity is the Pancreatic Cancer Research Fund. Forty years ago, few children survived childhood leukaemia; now the survival rate is 80%. Forty years ago, only 46% of women diagnosed with breast cancer survived five years or more; now that figure is also 80%. Forty years ago, 3% of people diagnosed with pancreatic cancer survived five years or more. That figure is still 3%. Nearly 9,000 people each year are diagnosed with pancreatic cancer in the UK and, in the past, the attention given to this disease has been minimal. The mission of this year's chosen charity is to defeat pancreatic cancer by funding and promoting innovative, world-class research into the disease - research that will lead to the development of more effective detection, diagnosis and treatment. # **Nature Notes**

Autumn begins.



Before the leaves all fall to the ground, we have that most attractive time when the greens fade and an amazing palette of other colours appears. A variety of ripening fruit on hedges and trees add their own special colours too, with rose hips, hawthorn berries and of course in Herefordshire our special

extra – apple orchards. Before the severe frosts turn them brown, there are late flowers to be seen – fuchsias, chrysanthemums, dahlias, cosmos, geraniums and roses to mention just a few I can see as I write in mid October. All can have a cheering effect at this otherwise rather gloomy time of year, with grey skies and dark evenings steadily closing in upon us.

One or two unusual birds to report on - Dave Grace tells me that he has been visited recently by a nuthatch, which is a fascinating little bird to watch. We have seen pied wagtails patrolling our roof looking for small insects and arachnids and these are also fun to watch. More unusual two days ago, was a yellow wagtail which came to have a look at our pond, where a couple of large dragonflies were darting about. Several sightings have been made recently of red kites, which do seem to be far more common than they were a few years ago. Plenty of robins singing their cheerful songs are to be heard everywhere!

The sudden bout of unseasonably warm weather brought by ex-hurricane Ophelia passing close by, has encouraged a late flush of butterflies. We have seen a good number of red admirals and tortoiseshells, with an occasional speckled wood. AR



# Weather Watch

## Dilwyn Weather for September 2017

Just like August, September this year turned out to be a rather cloudy affair. Rainfall was average at just over two and a half inches (66mm),

increasing our year to date total to 21 inches (525mm). Temperatures also caused no surprise, the daytime average being 18 degrees. Some very chilly nights (we recorded zero or below twice, and several other nights very close to that) resulted in the night time average being just 5 degrees. Just three days were 'mostly sunny' so cloudy days really did predominate!

As with August, so September failed to bring us a decent high pressure system. In mid month the barometer fell into the 980mb area, bringing strong winds and even an unseasonal storm (Storm Aileen brought disruption to many parts of the country. Herefordshire thankfully escaped the worst). The best we could manage was 1025mb – and that was short lived. No Indian summer for us this year! AR

The full, approved minutes of Dilwyn Parish Council meetings, as prepared by the Parish Clerk, are published regularly on the Village Notice Boards and Website. What follows here summarises matters of particular interest and any decisions taken at a specific meeting.

#### <u>The Regular Meeting of Dilwyn Parish Council</u> <u>held in the St. Mary's CE Primary School, Dilwyn on</u> <u>Tuesday, 5<sup>th</sup> September, 2017</u>

At this meeting, 10 Councillors were present, with apologies from Cllrs. R. Brown and J. Lewis. The Ward Member, Cllr. Mark Cooper and the Parish Clerk, Mr. Gwilym Rippon were in attendance; there were three members of the public present.

#### a. Public Participation:

- To receive the Police report. There was no police presence.
- To receive the Ward Councillor's report. The Ward member in his report gave an in-depth view on planning matters.
- There were two questions from one member of public:
- (i) As there was currently no resident chef at the Crown Inn, had the Council considered the possibility of running a contract kitchen? The answer was in the positive.

## WAR MEMORIAL Carved in Stone: Remembered in our Communities

*Celebrating the churches in the Deanery and discovering the stories of lives remembered.* This is our legacy in stone, wood and glass of our communities built up from human lives well lived, from deep faith, steadfast commitment, personal tragedy, heroic endeavour and love. Our buildings are the treasure houses of memory and therefore invite us to find time to explore and think about what endures in life in our own frantic age of distractions and pressurised time. THE CHURCH OF ST MARY, DILWYN

The large Church of St Mary, Dilwyn is mostly of thirteenth century origin with an earlier west tower. There are several ancient stone monuments inside the church and it would be difficult to choose what to describe among the beautiful stained glass, fourteenth century tiles or the Royal Coat of Arms of George III. However, because this church is part of the Leominster Deanery it is a good opportunity to describe a memorial that stands outside. In a prominent position beside the path just inside the churchyard stands the figure carved by W. G. Storr-Barber in 1920 to commemorate the men of the village who lost their lives during the First World War.

W. G. Storr-Barber lived in Leominster in the Bargates. His yard where he worked carving stone was in Etnam Street from 1910 until 1924. His carving in marble had a vivid realism. At St Michael and All Angels, Mitcheldean, the beautiful white marble reredos there completed in 1911 depicts Christ preaching surrounded by life size figures modelled by local townspeople in memory of their revered surgeon Herbert Fitz-Jones. This beautiful sculpture is an extraordinary example of the skill of a Leominster craftsman working from a local yard in the town over one hundred years ago.

A Quaker with strongly held convictions, he supported the No Conscription Fellowship which successfully campaigned to secure the 'conscience clause' in the 1916 Conscription Act, which gave the right to claim exemption from military service. The Quakers often joined the Forces Ambulance Service where their courage caring for the wounded was recognised by all. The Special Home Coast Defence Force Coastal Service proved to be a compromise for Storr-Barber. Stationed in Devon he enlisted at the age of forty-two.

There he was well known as 'The Quaker who joined the Royal Marines' when he carved the War memorial there in the city of Plymouth at the end of the war. The minute detail of the figure and authenticity of the uniform depicting a private soldier standing with head bowed was much admired and this led to further commissions. Locally, the memorial in Leominster in the Grange, the plain cross at Weobley, and the statue of St Ethelbert outside the Catholic Church at Leominster are all examples of Storr-Barber's skill and attention to detail.

At Dilwyn, the stone figure of the private soldier stands with arms in the reverse position holding a 0.303 Lee Enfield rifle. Dressed in World War I battle uniform, the reverse arms position is formed by placing the muzzle of the rifle on the left foot. Both hands with palms facing downwards are placed across the rifle butt. The soldier is wearing the 'tin hat' issued in May 1916.

Storr-Barber died of pneumonia at the age of fifty-eight. The realism of his carving enabled him to show the reality of conflict and his work has subsequently promoted peace by

commemorating the suffering that war brings. It is difficult to look at the statue at Dilwyn and not remember the lost generation of this village that is remembered in this memorial carved by a man of true Quaker belief.

Note: thanks to Richard Hall for finding this piece about the carver of our War Memorial ,which came to him via Stuart Hinton and Joyce Marston of Kimbolton who did the research.



# Dilwyn Neighbourhood Watch

This year's annual meeting of the Dilwyn Neighbourhood Watch was held in The Crown on Tuesday, 10th October. A report was given by CSO Dick Alford, who expressed satisfaction with the low level of crime in Dilwyn Parish, at least part of which he put down to the efforts of the NW patrols and warning posters. He explained some of the latest advances in technology now being used by the Police to improve communications, between themselves and also with the general public. Changes were being made to the local policing team, which we would be told more about as they happened.

Treasurer Tony Roberts confirmed that the Neighbourhood Watch remained solvent, thanks to the donation from Dilwyn Village Show a couple of years ago. The only recent expenses had been for new Neighbourhood Watch posters, which had been put up all around the village as a warning to those of evil intent!

It was the feeling of the 14 members who attended, that the new system of patrols had worked very well. Time, route and mode of transport could be chosen to suit those taking part, and far more ladies were now involved. It was pointed out, however, that no ladies had attended the meeting and perhaps this should be addressed in the coming year.

Mr Paul Styles spoke to the meeting about a method of linking all members of NW using modern technology. He offered to form this link, using an encrypted app., suitable for computer and smart phone. Please text Paul on 07882595243 so that he can add you to the group and then warnings, photos, information etc can be sent between group members.

To save on time and administration costs, it would be most useful if I could have an email address from each member, so that the patrols rota can then be sent direct to you.

## ALLAN LEONARD LEWIS VICTORIA CROSS

Next year we commemorate the centenary of the ending of the First World War. This brings into sharp focus the incredible sacrifice made by a generation of young men and women in order to help make the world a better place. We may not all agree with the reasons for the conflict and the brutal warfighting, but one cannot but have admiration for individual acts of courage and humanity which stood out amongst the death and despair.

You may have recently seen in the local papers, or heard on the radio, the story of Allan Leonard Lewis. He was born in Whitney-on-Wye Wye in the far West of Herefordshire and later moved to a the neighbouring parish of Brilley. Allan served in the First World War (1914-18) and went on to show exceptional bravery that was witnessed on two separate occasions during the final allied push to break the German Hindenburg Line in late 1918. Tragically, he was killed on 21st September 1918, only a short time before the end of the war. He has no known grave.

To date, he remains Herefordshire's only county-born Victoria Cross winner. There are memorials for him in both Whitney and Brilley church yards; the one in Whitney on the side of the church is in wood and was hand-carved by his father. It is not surprising that raw emotions meant that his father gave his son the wrong initial, an error that is still there to this day. To coincide with the 100th anniversary of his death, the **A L Lewis VC Memorial Fund** has been set up. The group is working with the support of Herefordshire County Council to honour this Herefordshire hero and to also commemorate all those who died in the conflict. The aim is to commission a life-size bronze statue of Allan to be located in a prominent position in Hereford. The artist will be Jemma Pearson, who sculpted the statue of Elgar which stands in the Cathedral grounds.

The design will not be martial or triumphal, but will show Allan in his soldier's uniform with a smile on his face, looking upwards in anticipation of a better future; a future that evaded him and many others. # **Heating Oil Syndicate**

Dear Members I hope you are surviving the atrocious weather we seem to be getting; all we can hope for is an improvement next year.

September orders were good with a total of well over **12850** litres with some fill up's taking it to probably over **13000** litres. The orders went to O J Williams (Certas Energy) but I am afraid with great disappointment, after the orders were scanned and emailed through, they could not even get the complete list of members delivered, and I believe there were two members who did not get their oil at the same delivery slot as the others, I understand that there is still one member who has not received the delivery and we are now approaching the next order. I will not be happy dealing with them again unless they can assure me of good service.

The price was good at 36.84p per litre, which was nearly 1p cheaper than our usual supplier, that is of course why they received the order, but customer service failed drastically with many chase up calls from myself and the members.

Prices were Watson 38.95p, Oil4Wales 39.20p, OJ W (Certs Energy) 36.84p, and Beacon Fuels 37.5p (I do wish Beacon could have even matched the price, they would have delivered with no problems)

My apologies to those two who had problems last month, I will try to ensure that it does not happen again.

The trend so far has risen and fallen again, so hopefully we can get a decent price for October. 22nd September was £361 per 900 litres, steady for three days with a sudden rise to £365, then again rising to £366 on 2nd October which it peaked, then slowly fell to £362 on 16th, it is still the same as of today, fingers crossed for another blip down before the order.

I hope you all have a pleasant November and hope to see you without the Sou'wester. Pete

# Launch of New Book



The Story of Dilwyn, a new book about the parish of Dilwyn, is to be launched at the Cedar Hall on Saturday, 11th November, starting at 2.30pm, with copies on offer at the discounted price of £10 as against the retail price of £12.95. Short talks will be given, refreshments provided and there will be a display of photographs. Tony Hobbs and Andrew Stirling-Brown, each a resident of Dilwyn, one for almost two decades, the other for all his life, have combined to write this book about the parish.

At the time of Domesday there were several manors in the parish, some held by Saxons and others by Normans. Over time these landholdings were amalgamated through marriage or purchase, or split through a divided inheritance, to lead to the pattern of

landholdings in the parish today. This book gives an outline history of some of the post Domesday landowners and their families, along with what is known of the castle site and development of the churches at both Dilwyn and Stretford, and the brief appearance Dilwyn made in the Civil War.

Much of the book then focuses on the past 150 or so years, giving the history of the Great House, Perrymead and the conversion of barns to form Karen Court and the associated creation of the village green. It tells the stories of the school, the local shops, pubs, businesses and some of the farms. It details the arrival of nonconformity, relates anecdotes of the Home Guard during the Second World War, and recounts the writing of The Tangled Garden by Elizabeth Coleman, elements of local folklore, the successes of village cricket and football teams, the construction of the by-pass, and the story of the local WI. The book is well illustrated with 70 colour and 60 black and white illustrations, and is published by nearby Logaston Press.
